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What's your proudest professional achievement of the past year and why?

Build deep expertise, but never stop learning. The pace can feel relentless, but it also means there's always a new opportunity to step up, lead a novel transaction, and prove that you belong at the table. Trust your preparation, raise your hand, and don't wait for permission to take on the hardest problems.

What is a group, tool or initiative that has helped you grow in your career or contributes to the development of pipelines for women leaders in tech law?
